Mr. Kelly, Town Manager reported that Tonya Triplett, Deputy Clerk received her Certified Municipal Clerk Certificate and would be working toward Master Municipal Clerk.

F. PETITIONS, PUBLIC HEARINGS AND FIRST READING OF ORDINANCES

1. PUBLIC HEARING –Purchase of property, 1980 square feet, more or less, being a portion of Tax Map No. 018-9-A-6, currently owned by John W. and Louise S. Crigger, 138 Williams Street, Abingdon, Virginia 24211

John Dew, Director of Public Services and Construction stated that the purchase of the property is necessary in order to complete the Urban Path Project and is critical in the continuity of the project. The purchase price is \$7,000 and Mr. Kelly, Town Manager stated there are grant funds left in the budget to purchase the property. Mr. Humphreys questioned the property line near the Epling property and inquired if parking would be lost. Mr. Dew stated the trail will be 10 feet wide and would likely affect parking on the right-of-way.

Mayor Morgan declared the public hearing open and asked if anyone had comments. Hearing none, Mayor Morgan declared the public hearing closed.

On motion by Mrs. Lowe and seconded by Mr. Howard the Council authorized Mr. Kelly, Town Manager to purchase and execute all necessary documents for the purchase of 1980 square feet, more or less, being a portion of Tax Map No. 018-9-A-6, currently owned by John W. and Louise S. 2. PUBLIC HEARING – Petition from property owners to consider a proposed partial road closure of Rugby Terrace and consideration of appointment of Board of Viewers.

John Dew, Director of Public Services and Construction reported concerns about safety and cut through traffic on Rugby Terrace from citizens as far back as 2002. A petition was received from residents in July, the temporary closing of the East leg of Rugby Terrace was

approved and town staff was asked to conduct a traffic study. Mr. Dew reported the closure decreased cut through traffic 50-80% making it safer and having a positive impact on the residential neighborhood. Mr. Dew also stated the temporary closure did not affect the traffic on Main or Valley Streets. If the road is closed, the town will not relinquish the right-of-way and will install removable bollards in case emergency vehicles need access.

Mayor Morgan opened the public hearing and asked if anyone had comments.

- Doc O’Neal, 480 Valley Street stated cut through traffic and speeding created safety issues. The temporary closure has taken care of those issues, the residents are very pleased with the closure. Mr. O’Neal asked Council to consider the partial closure of Rugby Terrace.
- Laura Beth Hale, 483 Valley Street stated that it is difficult for residents to back out of their driveways and she support the partial closure of Rugby Terrace.
- Nick Proctor, 11092 Treeline Drive supports the closure.
- Anne Hutton, 101 A Valley Street is opposed to closing Rugby Terrace and stated it would hinder her ability to access her property. Ms. Hutton suggested the speed limit be reduced and enforced as an alternative to closing Rugby Terrace.

Mayor Morgan declared the public hearing closed.

Mrs. Lowe questioned how many residents live on Cambridge Oxford and stated the streets are very narrow and there are no sidewalks.

On motion by Mr. Humphreys and seconded by Mrs. Lowe the Council appointed a Board of Viewers to look at the information for the partial closing of Rugby Terrace consisting of: Monty Vernon, Jim Smith and Stephen Jett with Al Bradley as an alternate member. The Board of Viewers will receive the written information that was presented to Council and make a recommendation at the February Council Meeting.

- 1. Second Reading of Ordinance of the Council of the Town of Abingdon, Virginia to Repeal, Amend, and Reenact Chapter 34, Fire Prevention and Protection, Article III, Section 34-511 through Section 34-58 of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Abingdon.**

Greg Kelly, Town Manager reviewed updates to the Fire Prevention and Protection Ordinance

The updates allows the town to hire staff, approve fees for services, allows local certified fire officials to carry out annual inspections and to implement and update the code, which will improve the town’s rating and reduce fire insurance premiums for business owners and residents.

Mr. Humphreys questioned how the community will be informed of fees and inspections. Mrs. Rosenbaum stated that once staff is hired they would make face to face contact with business owners.

Mrs. Duehring noted the inspections will warrant a cost savings on insurance premiums.

1. Confirmation of satisfaction of the archeological requirement for the Marathon Realty commercial development property

Greg Kelly, Town Manager reported that the archeological survey showed there is no evidence of intact archaeological deposits on the 33 acres and that Marathon Realty has requested the archeological requirement be lifted from the rezoning. The report showed there are some sites on the 40 acres now owned by the town and the house is eligible for placement on the National Historic Registry listing.

On motion by Mr. Howard, seconded by Mrs. Lowe the Council consider the requirement of the archeological study that was placed as a contingency of the rezoning of Marathon Realty commercial property from AFOS to B2 to be deemed fully complied with and removed at this time as any further requirement of the rezoning.

2. Recommendation of consultant review of the design of the Sports Complex facility

Matthew Johnson, Director of Planning stated that three bids have been received for the development of the sports complex design which includes: Cooper Carry - \$34,000, Hill Studio - \$22,500 and CHA - \$22,300. Mr. Johnsons reported that CHA's experience in municipal recreation, coupled with their familiarity with the Town, leads the staff to recommend them for award of a contract to assist the town with the development of a master plan for the new sports complex. Their experience with municipal recreation is evident as they have developed over 100 municipal recreation parks in Virginia and around the nation. CHA has voiced their commitment to the preservation and constructive reuse of the "Meadows" farmhouse and associated structures for incorporation into the overall master plan for the sports complex. The scope of work included: assist in developing a master plan, provide direction to preservation, mitigate any perceived impacts on the Creeper Trail, provide staff for public input workshops and deliver a master plan, associated graphics, and baseline budget for costs to develop the facility as proposed.

On motion by Mrs. Lowe, seconded by Mrs. Duehring the Council upon the recommendation of Mr. Johnson, Director of Planning to hire lower bidder, CHA to oversee the design of the sports complex and to pay \$22,300.00 from Council consulting line item which includes assists in developing a master plan, provide direction to preservation, mitigate any perceived impacts on the Creeper Trail, provide staff for public input workshops and deliver a master plan, associated graphics, and baseline budget for costs to develop the facility as proposed.
