

Finally, on October 31^{st,} the department participated in a statewide, "Halloween Tweet Along." This event encourages the information officers in each agency to ride with officers to provide timely information on the

During the month of October the police department spent <u>33.5 hours</u> either waiting in the ER with ECO patients or in transport of TDO patients. This came at a <u>direct, unsubsidized, cost to</u> <u>the tax payers of \$1,118.45</u> for the month. This equates to \$276.61 per mental health event during the month of October. Officers from the department traveled 714.2 miles in transport of mental health cases.

In order to have an understanding of how mental health cases affect the department and the taxpayers, I have developed the following chart to track the hours and total cost associated with mental health cases each month:

School Resource Officers Report - October

During the month of October, Officer DeBusk began his assignment as the School Resource Officer at Abingdon High School. He spent the beginning of the month getting to know the students and the staff. He has been working on preventing incidents by being visible in the hallways and engaging in conversations with the students and staff. During the month of October, the following are reportable offenses:

Abingdon High School:

Miscellaneous call - 2 Tobacco Violation - 4 Reckless Driving - 1

E.B. Stanley:

Miscellaneous - 1 Lost property - 1 Assault - 1

For the month of October, the following non-reportable incidents occurred at Abingdon High school or E.B. Stanley Middle school.

On October 23rd, Officer DeBusk at the request of the assistant principal, checked on four students who had been absent from school for several days and were on the brink of having truancy charges filed against them. After checking on the students' welfare, and making contact with their guardians, two of the four have been making an effort to attend school regularly.

On October 24th, Officer DeBusk assisted a student who had been found in possession of marijuana with seeking assistance for mental health services. The student, who was legally an adult, voluntarily requested assistance and was transported to the hospital.

On October 24th, Officer DeBusk was advised of disagreement between two students over property they had exchanged over the past couple of months. The disagreement was on the verge of becoming an altercation on school grounds, but was diverted after Officer DeBusk spoke with both students and their guardians about their legal options and consequences.

On October 2nd, Officer Heath spoke to a high school student who was potentially having problems at home with family members that are using drugs. A friend of the family was concerned that this student may also be using as well.

Officer Heath on a weekly basis has recruited the assistance of two boys in Mrs. Jenny Mitchell's class room in checking doors to make sure they are secured. These two boys are interested in law enforcement and look forward to helping anyway they can every week.

Daily checks of doors and outside premises are performed at each school on a regular basis as well to ensure the security and safety of staff and students in the buildings.

Calls for Service:

For the month of October, the department responded to 366 calls for service. We were able to close all but 26 of those calls. This gave us an overall clearance rate of 94.4 percent for the month. The department responded to 45 IBR reportable cases in the month of October; at the conclusion of the month, 23 remained active. This resulted in a clearance rate of 48.8 percent for all IBR offenses during the month of October.

Traffic Enforcement News:

No grant enforcement during month. The grant for this fiscal year has expired.

As always, I am eager to address any questions or concerns you may have concerning the operations of the police department.


